The first local newspaper, "The Almont Advertiser" was owned and edited by Mr. Anderson. Later he became associated with the Farmers State Bank, where he served for many years.

On June 29, 1910, he and Miss Nell Anderson, formerly of Obebolt, IA, were married in Bismarck, ND, and established their home in the Pelette residence.

Because of illness he retired from active business life in the year 1932, but was interested in all community activities.

Mr. and Mrs. Hans Anderson were both born in Telamarken, Norway; Mr. Anderson on July 19, 1858, and Mrs. Anderson on August 23, 1862. Hans came to the U.S. at the age of 11 years with his parents and settled in Rio, WI. They lived there three years; moved to Lake Benton, MN, in 1873, where they remained for 15 years. Hans attended rural school there. He married Rachael Hovden of Lake Benton in 1882 and moved to Sims in 1887, in a caravan of five covered wagons. In the caravan with them and their children, Albert and Amelia, were Andrew Anderson, brother of Hans; Mr. and Mrs. Hans Bjorum and son, Edward; Mr. and Mrs. Tronson and family, and Mr. and Mrs. Langdon and family. The Anderson wagon had a cookstove with them so when they needed to bake bread they unloaded the stove and spent the day baking. In the evening they sat around the campfire singing and reminiscing.

Later Hans took up a homestead on the Heart River, 12 miles southeast of Almont. There was good water and lots of trees, which pleased Mrs. Anderson. They spent their entire lives here, except for three years spent at Sheridan, OR. They went to Oregon in 1911, accompanied by their daughters, Margaret, Lena and Clara, and during their stay their sons, Sam and Henry, operated their 840-acre farm.

When the Andersons first lived on the Heart River, there were rumors that the Indians were coming from the south to scare out the new settlers and one time Hans took his family to Sims, a distance of 16 miles by wagon, so they would be safe. However, the attack never materialized.




Hans Anderson Family

Regina (Knutson) Anderson, the daughter of Andrew and Mary (Foss) Knutson, was born March 29, 1895, at the family homestead near Almont. She worked in the postoffice operated by her father and the store owned by her parents for a number of years preceding her marriage.

They settled on the Martin Wohlman place, 6 miles southwest of Almont, where they lived for 12 years at which time they bought the Bachler home place.

On June 22, 1953, a baby girl was born. They called her JoAnn and she died of pneumonia on July 10 of the same year. The children following were Dean, Patricia, Renee and Pamela. Five years later came Annette, then the three boys to even out the ratio: Joel, Edward Jr. and Anthony. Dean, the oldest, married Kathy Renner on Feb. 28, 1976. They are now living three miles west of the Bachler farm with two boys, Joey and Mark. Patricia married Richard Frohlich in September of 1977. They are now in Glen Ullin with their daughter, Elizabeth. Renee, single, is a senior at Mary College majoring in Social Work. Pam. married Bill Willman in 1980, has a son, Jeremey, and they are at home in Mandan. Annette is a sophomore in high school and Joel is a freshman. Ralph Bakken continued to work for the Northern Pacific Railroad as a section foreman in the Yellowstone division. At times he had 20 or more men in his charge. He later was section foreman in the Curlew

and Sims areas. Mr. Bakken was stricken with a paralytic stroke in June of 1920. The Bakkens had made Sims their home since coming to this country. They were members of the Sims Lutheran church.

Walter and Anna were married Feb. 1, 1926, at the home of her parents. Rev. Thornell officiated and C.L. and Ellen Anderson were their attendants. At the time of their marriage, Walter was the depot agent at Pompeys Pillar, MT, but was later transferred to Richardton, ND. Walter was agent at many different points in the Yellowstone division before he became agent at Almont in 1928. The couple lived on the second floor of the NP structure until it was gutted by fire in 1931. The Bakkens escaped with only their nightclothes. They credit Warren Becklund for their safety as he saw the flames and awakened them.

The depot was rebuilt and Walter continued there as the agent until 1947 when the railroad was rerouted and the depot moved to North Almont. Walter was then the agent there until his retirement in 1966. After the fire they moved to Anna's parents' farm.

They later bought the farm and made it their home until 1976, at which time they went to the Marion Manor Nursing Home, Glen Ullin, ND, and later the Elm Crest Manor Retirement Home, New Salem, ND.

Both Walter and Anna were active in the Sims church and its organization as well as in other community affairs. Anna was a member of the Live and Learn Homemakers Club of Almont.

The couple had no children.

Walter died July 17, 1978, and Anna lives at Elm Crest Manor, New Salem, ND.

Olga passed away in 1924.

On June 24, 1926, he married Ragna Olson Aanstad, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Olson, who was born Dec. 20, 1892. Her children are Louise (Mrs. Lars Handegard), Almont; Karine (Mrs. Irvin Miller), Bismarck; and Selmer, Billings, MT. Four children were born to Ragna and Thorvald: Thelma (Mrs. Victor Bushnell), Myrtle Point, OR; Alta (Mrs. Roy Schaar), Scranton, ND; Ruby (Mrs. Eddie Kilen) Puyallup, WA, and Obert, Mandan.

They had 27 grand-children and 25 great-grandchildren. Their son, Obert, bought the home place and farms it, besides teaching in the Bismarck High School.

Sims, ND, on Jan. 26, 1885, and grew up in that

community.

Jim and Dena were married in Mandan, ND, June 3, 1907. They lived for a short time on the Larson ranch where their first child, Evelyn Ruth, was born July 3, 1908. Then they moved into Almont and opened a cafe. At this time there was a lot of traffic in the new town as people from south of Almont had to come to town to get their supplies of all kinds as the railroad had not yet

As I write this, I remember Mom saying that she would look out into the dining room which had long tables and benches and hope no more people would come in as they were so very busy and overly tired. Raymond Wellington, the first son of the family, was born in Almont August 30, 1909. Shortly after that the family moved back to Milroy, MN, as Jim's mother was very ill and needed care. The family remained in Minnesota until the summer of 1922 when they returned to Almont. While in Minnesota, Webster Warren born on May 28, 1911; Walter Harrison on April 13, 1913; Vivian Lois on Feb. 4, 1915, and Blanche May on May 18, 1918, were added to the family.

At the time we came back to Almont there had not been a hotel open for some time so the folks reopened the hotel and Jim had a filling station selling

Nels E. Becklund was born on a farm near Winthrop, MN, in 1885. After reaching manhood he became interested in business and was sent to the new town of Almont by E.W. and A.L. Olson of the Winthrop Bank. The Farmer's State Bank of Almont was organized in 1907 with E.W. Olson, E.W. Hyde, Jens Nelson, G.H. Anderson and Nels on the board. The bank closed in 1931 during the depression vears. Among the former bookkeepers were Christine Nelson, Robert Becklund, Carl Sherwood, Henry Peck, Mrs. P.D. Pfaff and Mrs. Becklund.

In 1918 Nels married Beatrice Williams, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. P.O. Williams of Otter Creek. Beatrice had come to Almont in 1915 to teach piano and later she clerked in the O.C. Ellingson and C.E. Kelsven stores. For about 30 years after the Almont Lutheran church was organized she was the church

pianist and music director.

Nels maintained an interest in the oil and gas business in Almont for many years but was chiefly engaged in farming. The Becklunds moved to Minneapolis, MN, in April 1963 and Mr. Becklund passed away there June 5, 1964. Mrs. Becklund still lives there.

Bennie was talented at carving and making model ships. He also spent much of his spare time making drawings, designing cabinets and houses. He thought future houses should be made from glass but felt the quality of glass had to be improved. He was artistic in this type of work as a youngster and was invited to work as a sculptor by his cousin, Gustave Vigeland, but he chose to come to America.

Bennie had a good line of farm equipment and horses but drought and depression caused him to lose it all during the early 1930's. He moved to a high hill on the Andrew Torgerson farm, made a dugout which everlooked the land he had owned. The dugout was very neat and well kept. After living in this dugout for about two years, he moved to his uncle's farm (Oscar Thorson), helping with the farm work until he decided to return to Norway in 1949. He continued raising a garden and flowers until his death in 1975.

Bennie was a religious man. He never smoked or drank alcohol. Throughout his life he continued to give all but the bare necessities to charities and the unfortunate.

They were aoina through some timber country looking for some outlaws: Ben's brother came upon one of the outlaws lying on his back seemingly dead. The outlaw suddenly came to life and fatally shot Ben's brother. The third cattle drive was to Williston and was called the Long Bar Drive.

He always had good horses and raced them as a hobby.




elected mayor. After his father passed away in 1964 he purchased the family farm along with his brother, Clarence, which he operated until the time of his death in 1975.

Ralph A. Dawson was born in Clear Lake, IA, in 1898 and came to North Dakota in 1903 with his parents, R. John and Elizabeth Dawson. He lived with his parents in a two-room sod house for seven years before moving into a ten-room frame house built in 1910. Their homestead was located in Morton County, about 17 miles northeast of Flasher. The home place became known later as the Oak Coulee Ranch.

Ora Helmick Dawson was born in 1896 at Skidmore, MO, to Levi and Clara Helmick. She came with her parents to North Dakota in 1904 and settled on a homestead in Pierce Co., north of Rugby. She attended rural school and Rugby High School, then went on to Mayville and Minot Normal School and became a teacher. In 1918 she secured a teaching position in the Oak Coulee School District and it was there she met her husband-to-be, Ralph Dawson. After teaching six years and getting married in 1920, they ventured out on their own.

In 1923 they moved to the northern part of the state and farmed in Rolette and Pierce counties during an 8-year period. In 1931 they moved back to Grant Co. where they moved to what was known as the S.P. Weekes Ranch, located 11 miles north of Lark on the Heart River. It was here Ralph started a diversified operation of a good grade of Angus cattle and raised a variety of small grains and corn.

During the depression of the "30's", they felt the pinch of the economy along with everyone else. Ralph's mechanical skills were a big factor in making ends meet by rebuilding or remodeling rather than having to replace, during this time. His talents were also used by many neighbors who would bring their cars or tractors over for him to repair while they often would do some kind of labor for him. Money seldom ever changed hands for such labors. Of course, much of his labor was free.

Summer Sundays usually found Ora mixing homemade ice cream for the neighborhood kids. The boys got river ice from the ice-house and cranked the freezer for a treat to enjoy after swimming in the river.

During the 1940's, with the family members being old enough to help run the farm, Ralph ventured into the trucking business on a part-time basis to supplement the family income. In 1948 they retired from the farming operation and it was taken over by their sons, Levi and Wendal. Ralph then spent his time doing plumbing in many rural and city homes as the introduction of rural electric power provided pressure systems on the farms across the plains. Ora returned to teaching for several years.

In 1960 Ralph and Ora took up residence in Almont, where they retired. Ralph passed away in April of 1966 and Ora remained in their home for six years, then sold it and moved to New Salem in 1972, where she still resides.

Ora has been an active member of the American Legion Auxiliary and was awarded a lifetime membership by Almont Post 261 in 1978.
