Axel Nelson was born in Bodi, Norway, in 1890. He came to the United States in 1909, spending two

years in Mandan and then moving to the Curlew vicinity in 1911. He bought Joe H. Olson's homestead and farmed there until 1942 and then sold out because of ill health. He moved ½ mile north of Almont, where he bought an 80-acre farm from Olaf Overgaard.

Axel began working for Agricultural Adjustment Administration in 1936 and continued to work with this administration until his death in 1955. His work included measuring fields and grain bins. Also checking farm practices in Morton County.

Axel had a few hobbies and card playing was one of them. He loved to play whist. He was one of the best players in the area and was

well known for his fairness and honesty with everyone.

Axel managed to make a trip back to his home country, Norway, during the late forties.

MR. AND MRS. JENS NELSON

Jens Nelson, born in Aalborg, Denmark, in 1853 and his wife, Mary Larson, also born in Aalborg on March 15, 1850, came to the United States in 1879, locating in Chicago where Jens was employed delivering milk. In 1887 the family moved to Bancroft, IA, where Jens was engaged in farming and stock buying for 10 years. They lived in Ringstad, IA, for four years and then moved to the "land of opportunities", settling in Almont in the spring of 1907. They had nine children, all born in Chicago and lowa; one died at an early age and the three oldest had married before they came to Almont so did not move to North Dakota with them.

The Nelsons filed on a homestead southwest of Almont and Jens started the first hardware store in Almont in 1907 under the name of J. Nelson and Sons. In 1913 he entered partnership with E.E. Templeton, under the firm name of Nelson-Templeton Implement Co. This partnership lasted until Mr. Nelson's death in March 1927. Jens and Mary made

a trip back to their native land in 1910.

The Nelsons were charter members of the Almont Lutheran Church. Before Almont had electricity a power line was run from the Nelson's Delco electric plant to the church to provide the necessary lighting for evening meetings. The Almont community honored Grandma Nelson on her 81st birthday with a party. Her grandchildren, Marjorie and Burton, and other schoolchildren from the rural area made their home with Grandma Nelson as did several others employed in town. She passed away at her home on Christmas Eve 1933 at the age of 83.

The Nelson children were: Peter and wife, Nan, lived in Baker, MT, until 1930 when he went into partnership with Templeton in the implement company. He died in 1947 and his wife moved to Washington, D.C. and died Feb. 26, 1978, at the age of 96.

Judith (Mrs. E.W. Ladwig) lived in Barnard, SD, until her death in 1962. They had four children: Virginia, Waco. Averil and Lorraine.

Otto and wife, Alma, lived at Ceylon, MN. They had two children, Lawrence and Evelyn. He died in 1925.

Adolph died in the U.S. Army camp in 1918. His twin brother, Arthur, and wife, Marie, resided in Fargo until his death in 1960. Marie lives in Mesa, AZ, with their only child, Mercedes.

Christine (Mrs. Ben F. Gardner) worked several years in the Farmers State Bank in Almont. After her marriage, she lived in Minneapolis where she passed away in 1953, ten days after the death of their son and wife who were killed in an auto accident in Fargo. They had one other child, a daughter, Beverly.

Lawrence married Grace Jacobson. He was a World War II navy veteran and spent the rest of his short life in and around Almont. His sudden death in 1930 came three weeks after his family had moved to Mott where he had gone into partnership with his brother-in-law, W.E. Larson, in the White City Creamery. They had four children: Marjorie, Burton, Frances and Audrey.

Amanda (Mrs. W.E. Larson) worked in the Almont Postoffice and Kelsven Store for many years. After selling the White City Creamery in Mott in about 1935, they moved to a farm in Red Bluff, CA, and later had a small business in Redding, CA. They retired in 1953 and moved to Silverton, OR, where she passed away in a nursing home in 1972. Walter died in 1969. They had no children.

LAWRENCE C. AND GRACE (JACOBSEN) NELSON

Grace Nelson

Lawrence C. Nelson, one of nine children, was born in Bancroft, IA, on June 7, 1893, to Mr. and Mrs. Jens Nelson (who had arrived from their native Denmark in 1879). In 1907 he accompanied his parents to Almont where they homesteaded southeast of town. Lawrence was associated with his father and brothers in establishing the first hardware and implement store in Almont, continuing in this occupation until his enlistment in the U.S. Navy in 1914. He served as a bosun on the Battleship USS Carolina until his discharge in 1918. 1914 was also the year in which he and Grace Jacobsen were married.

Grace Agnes Jacobsen, youngest of three children, was born in St. Paul, MN, on April 7, 1891, to Mr. and Mrs. Nels Jacobsen. For the two summers following 1903, she and her family spent their summers living in a sod-covered house on her father's homestead claim, about 13 miles south of Sims, ND. In the spring of 1905 the family moved there permanently. In 1912 Grace filed on her own homestead claim southeast of her parent's farm, living the required time in a 12 x 12 shack which has since been relocated and restored as a family museum on Sig Peterson's O Bar O Ranch.

Grace's formal education did not include college; however, with the help of her sister, Carrie, she studied for, and passed a teacher's examination enabling her to teach in North Dakota. The difficulties encountered by teachers in a newly settled area such as North Dakota at that time was highlighted by the fact that at her first school, northeast of Judson, only one of Grace's ten pupils could speak English.

Marjorie Gail was born Nov. 6, 1914. During the years when Lawrence was in the Navy, Grace and Marjorie lived with grandparents and on the homestead claim and Grace worked occasionally as a seamstress and housekeeper for the Hyde and Templeton families in Almont. Lawrence was discharged in 1918 and returned to Almont to resume employment in the hardware store and also did some farming. After his father's death in 1927 he inherited an interest in the hardware business.

Leslie, second child of Lawrence and Grace, was born March 25, 1919, but in 1921 died of pneumonia, a then uncontrollable disease which felled many children, especially that winter. John Burton, their third child, saw the light of day December 22 of that same year.

During the 1920's, Lawrence was very active in Al-

mont and neighboring community affairs, primarily recreation and sporting activities. He was instrumenta! in promoting and building golf courses in both Almont and New Salem and a prime mover in getting the first tennis court and ice skating rink built in Almont. He gave his support and assistance to the formal introduction of ring pheasant and game birds to Morton County and helped organize and play on one of the first independent basketball teams in Almont. He could be counted on for his support and participation in skiing, tobogganing, skating or hunting and helped bring the first air show and parachute exhibition jump to Almont.

Two more children were born to Lawrence and Grace: Frances Corrine, March 1, 1929, and Audrey Lawrence, Aug. 11, 1930.

In 1930 Lawrence went into partnership with Walter and Amanda Larson (Lawrence's sister), in the White City Creamery in Mott, ND. The family moved there shortly after Audrey's birth and on Oct. 11, 1930, Lawrence suffered a cerebral hemorrhage and died at the age of 37. Grace and the children: Marjorie 15, Burton 7, Frances 19 months and Audrey 2 months, stayed in Mott for the remainder of the school year. During this time Audrey was very ill with pneumonia and had special nursing care. In the spring of 1931 the family moved back to Almont to the Jacobson farm where they made their home with Grace's aging mother and blind brother, Harry.

During the 30's, Grace continued to maintain the farm home for her mother and brother while bearing the sole responsibility for raising and caring for her children. After Marjorie moved to town in 1934,

where she was employed in the postoffice, she was able to share family responsibilities with her mother by providing a home and guidance for Burton, Frances and Audrey during the school year. In 1936 Audrey again had pneumonia and required special nursing care for several weeks. That year she also had eye surgery.

In 1937 Grace, Grandma Jacobsen and Harry moved to a rental house in Almont where they lived until Grandma's death in 1939. In that year Grace and the children and Harry moved into a new home she had built on the site of the first skating rink Lawrence had organized and helped build. She continued to reside there for more than 47 years and also provided a home and cared for her brother, Harry, until his death in 1957.

During these years in Almont, Grace worked as a clerk in the dry goods department of local stores, sewed and baked for others, (Her hand-decorated wedding cakes were much in demand), and provided board and room for many generations of students and schoolteachers. She became affectionately known throughout the community as "Grandma Grace."

Grace was also very active in church and community activities beginning in the early years of Almont. She is a charter member of the Almont Lutheran Church and women's organizations of the church, taught Sunday School for more than 25 years. Her rich contralto voice, regularly heard for many years in church choirs, other singing groups and also solo, is fondly remembered. In 1968 the Almont Homemakers Club, of which she was a charter member, bestowed on her the distinct honor of nomination for the North Dakota Mother of the Year.

Since October 1980, Grandma Grace has been a resident of Elm Crest Retirement Home in New Salem. She will celebrate her 90th birthday April 7.

Current status of the Nelson children is: Marjorie (Mrs. Sig Peterson), Almont (history found elsewhere in the book).

John Burton, Arlington, TX, married Louise Jeffers of Washington, D.C., attended Jamestown College, taught country school one year; U.S. Navy World War II; retired personnel director for Federal Bureau of Prisons; Two sons, Larry (wife Linda, two children, Michelle and Michael), and Steven, both of Arlington, TX.

Frances (Mrs. Willard Rusch), New Salem, ND; attended Bismarck Junior College, Dickinson State; taught at Almont High and Curlew country school; Four daughters: Joan (Mrs. Dave Turner), Las Vegas, NV; Susan, Aberdeen, SD; Linda, student at BJC; Jennifer, 5th grade.

Audrey (Mrs. Leon Olson), Williston, attended Dickinson State; Children: Lorin (wife Luceile, two sons, Seth and Nathan), Billings, MT; Teri (Mrs. Rodney Nelson), Towner, ND, and Lance, student at UND, Grand Forks.

The nuptial mass was performed by Rev. Father Bernard Fritz O.S.B. The music and singing was furnished by the Lutheran Choir from the Almont Lutheran Church.

They lived in Glen Ullin until February 1939. It was here that their son, Clarence Jr., was born. They moved to Almont and purchased the home of her folks. It was here that their second son, Darrel, was born.

Regina graduated from Almont High School and Dickinson Teacher's College. She taught school for 10 years.

Clarence worked for road contractors, in coal mines, and as a farm hand until he and August (Punch) Timpe went into partnership and ran the Timpe and Nilles Coal Company at North Almont. In 1943 they and August Timpe moved to North Almont where Clarence Jr. and Darrel attended grade school. Clarence and Punch first uncovered and loaded coal with a steam shovel, they later had a diesel shovel to do the work.

Trucks came from all over the state for coal, some came from as far as Minnesota and South Dakota.

Anna Nyquist

William O. Nyquist born in Lulio, Sweden, 1878, came to the United States with his parents in 1892, settling in Isabella, MI. After growing to manhood, he worked in logging camps for several years. Mrs. Nyquist, nee Anna Maria Lanng, was born near Randers, Denmark, in 1881 and came to Escanaba, MI, in 1902 where a brother was living. She and William Nyquist were married in October 1903. Mr. Nyquist was a carpenter and for several years was engaged in building houses for the Bay De Noc Lumber Co. in Nahma, MI, a town five miles from Isabella near Lake Michigan. They also owned and operated a small farm. Five children were born to this union, three daughters and two sons; a daughter died at age three and a son in infancy.

They lived in Isabella until the summer of 1918 when the family moved to a farm south of Almont. In 1920 they moved into the town of Almont where Mr. Nyquist operated a shoe repair shop and cream station. He died in the fall of 1922 after a year's illness. In May 1923 Mrs. Nyquist purchased a home owned by Miles Adams, one of the earlier homes in Almont. She continued to operate the cream station for the North American Creamery Co. for several years and also did practical nursing.

In May 1926 she took over the Northwestern Bell Telephone Exchange which, at that time, was housed in the Farmers State Bank and the switchboard was moved to her home. Her hours were long — from 7:00 A.M. until 9:00 PM. She also took emergency calls outside of regular hours. She was assisted by her son and daughters when they were at home. As time passed, three rural lines were added and a larger switchboard was installed but still manually operated. She operated this exchange for 17 years.

Ingeborg graduated in 1926 and taught school for five years before marrying Fritjof Trovik in May 1931.

Mimi graduated in 1927 and taught in the Judson area that fall, where she met Oscar Hoger. He was operating his parent's farm. They were married in Mandan in August of 1928 and his parents moved into New Salem that fall. Oscar and Mimi became owners of what was his parents' homesteads, each having filed on a quarter of land when they came here from Germany.

Oscar and Mimi had two children: a daughter, Audrey, and a son, Glyn, who both attended rural school and graduated from New Salem High School. Audrey taught school for two years, then married Kenneth Henke in June 1949. They reside on their parents' farm northeast of Hannover. They have two daughters and three sons: Mrs. Charles Cartwright (Valerie) who lives in Washington; Mrs. John Lambrecht (Vicki) in Detroit, MI; Ross and his wife in St, Louis, MO; Randy and Ricky at home. Randy has gone into dairying on the home farm and Ricky is a junior in Center High School.

Glyn was in the service for two years in Germany, coming home in May 1958. He went into a dairy partnership with his father which they operated together for several years. He now owns it and has enlarged it. He married Nancy Smith of Hankinson in 1960. They have three children: Kim, a student at Mary college; Scott, a sophomore in high scool and Susan a third grader.

Oscar and Mimi continued to live on the farm and be actively engaged in its operation. They moved into New Salem in 1975, but Oscar still spent much time on the farm; they also kept up their farm home. They were active members of the Zion Lutheran Church where they celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1978. Oscar had many friends who, with his devoted family, deeply mourned his sudden death in December 1979. Mimi continues to live in New Salem and is active in the church, the Judson Homemaker's Club, of which she has been a member since 1937, and in teaching classes in 4-H.

Henry graduated from high school in 1930. He did carpenter work and operated a small shop for some time. He was inducted into the air force in early 1942, stationed at Lowry Field near Denver, CO, before being transferred to Spokane, WA, in 1943. He married Eleanor Schwartz of New Salem in April 1942. She died in October 1943 when twin daughters were born to them in Spokane. He was later transferred to Sioux City, IA, where he was discharged from the service in 1945. He continued to live in Sioux City for several years where he operated a cabinet shop. He also remarried there and they had one daughter, Gretchen, who lives in Sioux City where she has a managerial position in a hospital.

Henry's mother went to Spokane and brought the twins, Adelaide and Eleanor, home with her and cared for them until they were 5½. Then she took them to Sioux City. Adelaide is a registered nurse and has worked for several years in the University Hospital in Iowa City, her alma mater. She has also attended the University there, pursuing a doctorate degree in art history and has done some teaching in this field. She did some of her research for this degree in Europe. She continues to live and work in

Iowa City.

Eleanor attended more than one college, then taught in Oneonta, NY, for a few years before going to the University of Kansas at Lawrence to complete her work for her doctorate degree in speech, drama and costuming. She did some of the research work for this degree in Europe, primarily in Sweden. While at Lawrence she met and married Dr. Bobby Patton, who heads up the speech department of the university and is the author of several books.



Ervin and Thelma had four children. Nellie, born in 1934, died of pneumonia in 1937.

Don Merle, born April 1, 1931, attended school in Curlew, Almont and Bismarck Junior College. He joined the armed forces in 1952 and was discharged in 1962 due to a leg problem. Don was involved in several businesses in Montana. His leg problem resulted in an MS condition. He passed away June 6, 1969.

Ardys was born June 1, 1938. She attended Eastern Montana College and Billings Business College. She has had employment at several business firms in Billings. She lives with her mother in Billings.

Audre was born Sept. 21, 1944. She received her schooling in Billings and took a data processing course in St. Louis, MO, which has been her line of work to the present. She married Gary Zent in 1969 and they live in Hysham, MT. They have two children, Darren and Jana.

JOHN E. AND TOBINE (JACOBSON) OLIN

John E. Olin was born in Harasand, Sweden, April 12, 1854. He came to Dakota Territory in 1882, and worked (cutting stone) on the Northern Pacific Railroad bridge across the Missouri River. Later that year he came to Sims to work at the brickyard, then a booming business, as were the coal mines.

Tobine Jacobson, born in Lyngdal, Norway, Feb. 22, 1861, came with her father, Jacob Abrahamson (later taking the name of Bringsjord, where he had lived in Norway, and three sisters, Petrine, Ingeborg and Anna. Tobine worked in Fargo before joining the others at Sims. She was a passenger on the first train that crossed the newly completed bridge between Mandan and Bismarck.

John and Tobine were married Oct. 19, 1884. They were the first couple to be married after the organization of the Sims Skandinavian Lutheran Church congregation which they had helped to charter in September of 1884.

John and Tobine homesteaded near Sims but later

moved to Mrs. Olin's father's homestead three miles north of Sims, where they made their home. John served as a deputy sheriff in Dakota Territory, was interested in state politics, and was present at the laying of the cornerstones for both of the state capitol buildings. The first ND capitol building was faced with brick from the Sims brickyard. The Olin home was a favorite meeting place for their friends, both young and old. They enjoyed company at all times and were known as "the young folk." John and Tobine were always ready to help whenever there was sickness or death and were active in church and community affairs.

John learned to drive a car after his 72nd birthday, practicing in a field of wheat shocks. He hit some of the shocks but mastered the driving so that he and Tobine could drive to Bismarck to visit two of their

daughters. The couple had seven children.

Rachel married Fred Swenson, Bismarck. They had six children. Fred served as Register of Deeds in Burleigh County; Rachel later held the same office. Rachel died in 1961.

Ellen married C.L. Anderson, foreman in a freight depot. The Andersons lived in Mandan, later moving to Billings, MT. They had six children, four of whom are living. Ellen died in 1971.

Jake, a son, died of typhoid fever in 1922; single. Emmanuel (Jack) married Nellie Johnson of Sims. He was a conductor on the Northern Pacific and later moved to California. They had three boys. Later Jack married Myrtle Sims of Mississippi. Jack died in 1956.

Anna taught school for several years before she married Walter Bakken, an operator and later depot agent at Almont. They bought the old homestead where they lived until moving into a retirement home. Anna is currently living at Elmcrest Manor, New Salem, ND.

Arthur married Delia Jacobson of Sims. They bought a farm near Sims and lived there until retiring and moving to New Salem. They had seven children,


five are still living. Arthur died in 1980.

Lucille married Thorvald Larson of Almont. They lived on a farm and ranch known as the Ramsland Hills, and had five children. Thorvald is currently at the Marion Manor Nursing Home, Glen Ullin; Lucille continues to live in Almont. Lucille is still an active member of the church her folks helped to establish.

John and Tobine lived to celebrate their 59th wedding anniversary. Tobine died in 1944 and John in 1946. John was the last surviving member of the original group that founded the Sims church.

Today's generation owes a deep debt of gratitude to the men and women whose vision and courage made possible the opening and developing of this western territory. John and Tobine were a part of that group with a vision and had the courage to stay and see that vision as it was developing.

Oscar Olin was born in Halaborn, Sweden, on Feb. 3, 1872. As a young man he engaged in lumbering there until he came directly to Sims, ND, in 1894. A cousin, John Olin, who had come previously, urged him to come too.

Oscar filed on a homestead three miles southeast of Sims. On April 6, 1906, he and Minnie Berdine Olson were married. She had come from Chicago in November to visit her brother, Nels Olson, who also had a homestead near "Olin's claim". Mrs. Olin also had an aunt, Mrs. Bertha Nelson, who had come from Norway to the United States nine years earlier. She had lived in Chicago up to this time.

The young couple established a home on the farm where they continued to live until 1943, when they moved into their house in Almont. Six children were born to them: Melvin, Myrtle, Alf and Agnes died in childhood. Alf Lenard passed away October 1961.

Orval, New Salem, married Ruth Willman. They have three children: Dennis married Carol Zeutchel, they have two children - Sandra and Darrin; Diane (Mrs. Steve Larson) has two daughters - Michelle and Malinda, resides in Minneapolis, MN; Arlen is employed and living in Minneapolis.

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Olin were members of the Sims Lutheran Church. Their home was always open to all who wished to come and enjoy their hospitality. Mrs. Olin passed away in July of 1961 and Mr. Olin in June, 1944.

manhood as a sailor in Norway until 1882, when he came to the United States and settled in Sims, ND. He secured work in a coal mine and also worked in the brickyard. Later he homesteaded west of Almont, ND.

In 1886 Ben was united in marriage to Bertha Kristine Pederson (better known as Stina). To this union seven children were born; namely, Tobine (Mrs. Tollef Christianson); Pauline (Mrs. Edward Christianson); Maria (Mrs.

Peter Stiller); Rudolph; Bernard (better known as Beas); Bertina and Bertinius (both of whom died in infancy). All seven of the children from the first family are deceased, including all of their spouses with the exception of Mrs. Beas (Huldah) Olson. She resides at Glen Ullin, ND.

ARNOLD G. OLSON





In 1914, at the early age of 15 years, he went to work for the Northern Pacific Railroad Co.

He married Huldah Mae Monson on Dec. 17, 1923. They made their home in the NPRR depot (then vacant) at the Curlew railroad station from 1923 to 1932, when they moved into the Curlew section-house. They boarded section men, rural teachers and kept two elderly people in their home for years.

Alma Olson began working in the postoffice for Postmaster Otis Malone and held that position until her retirement.




Marvin was active in many things. He farmed until 1975 and had a trucking line on the side until 1960. He helped Elvira Thiel start Curlew Valley's first 4-H club and served as leader for many years. He worked part-time for the Soil Conservation for many years; a good share of the trees you see around farmsteads and fields in Morton County were planted by him. When he helped plant the trees around the top of school hill in New Salem, the planter kept tipping over, but they finished the job with a few scrapes and bruises. The trees look nice up there! He measured fields for many years (one eccentric farmer objected and followed him back and forth with a gun threatening to shoot him in the back). He also raised work horses as a hobby and used them for many chores. He delivered mail and groceries with the sled and cutter when the roads were blocked in the winter time and always showed up on Santa Claus Day to give rides in the bobsled. He, or Melvin, drove the governor, senator or other state officials in the buggy on Labor Day parades up until 1976. He seeded grass in the ditches along the North Almont road when it was rebuilt with the horses. Several places were so steep the horses rolled over and got tangled in the harnesses. A picture of him working with his team, Molly and Dolly, was taken and used as the cover in the State Engineering Magazine.

Marvin started as a substitute rural mail carrier for his brother, Alden, in 1964 and after Allie's death he delivered mail until the routes were released on bids. He took over as mail clerk when Alma Olson retired, under Ben Ramsland, and kept that job until Ben retired in 1975. His appointment to postmaster was called through on Good Friday, 1975, during a bad blizzard. He was sitting in the bar trying to keep warm, as the electricity had been off for 24 hours. I've often wondered what they would have said if they knew they were calling the local pub to appoint a new postmaster!

The love of Marvin's life was cattle buying; he started out in 1960 working at Kist's and buying a little on the side. Over the years he built it up to an exciting business for eight months of the year. He never forgot a face or a name and knew where everyone lived in all the surrounding counties. He was instrumental in getting the Almont Weighing Association started and a scale and yards built. It has been added on to over the years and a lot of cattle pushed through. He also helped New Salem, Flasher and Glen Ullin plan their scale layouts. He was quite put out when Flasher built theirs just the opposite of the plans and the gates all opened the wrong way; he never weighed there if he could help it.

Joel took over most of the buying and shipping in 1975 when Marvin moved to town and became a full-time postmaster. Since Marvin's death in 1978, Joel has taken over the cattle business entirely. Pearl and Eric still live in Almont in the Becklund house. Peter lives on the old Keller place down by the river.

MR. AND MRS. MELVIN OLSON

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Olson - 60th anniversary

Melvin Leonard Olson, son of Rickart and Olena (Lewison) Olson, was born April 26, 1898, in Sims. He moved with his family to the homestead (now Melvin's home), 1½ miles west of what is now the town of Almont, in 1902. He married Marie Wedde, who was born Dec. 31, 1899, at Oxford, WI. Marie, being an adventurous kind, came out to work for people originally from Wisconsin. She liked North Dakota and stayed. Melvin and Marie were married at Mandan, ND, on July 26, 1920, by the Rev. C.J. Fylling.

Melvin and Marie lived on the Overgaard farm the first year they were married, moving to town for the winter as Melvin hauled mail to the Carl postoffice. In the spring they moved to the Pauline Christianson farm, living there until 1922 when they moved to the Compton place, living there until the spring of 1941 when they moved to the original homestead or home place where they still reside. 

RUDOLPH M. OLSON FAMILY

Rudolph Martin Olson was born at Sims, ND, June 23, 1891, to Rickart and Oleana Olson. He grew up on his parent's homestead, 11/2 miles west of Almont, ND. He worked for his parents until his marriage to Anna Oien on April 25, 1912. That summer they rented Oscar Thorson's farm and in the fall of 1913 they leased John Knutson's coal mine, a few miles south of Almont, It was an open mine and he sold and hauled to many people in and around Almont, with horses and sled.

The spring of 1914 they moved to Almont, where they bought Ben Bird's dray line, livery and feed barn, Later, Rudolph took over the Heart River mail route. In winter he drove a team of horses and delivered mail in a sled. It took all day to make the route and when he came to a certain farm at noon. he unhitched the horses, watered and fed them, and ate his dinner there. In winter when there was a lot of snow, he didn't get home until late in the evening. Once I recall, it was 10 o'clock in the evening before he got home.

Six children were born to the Olsons while they lived in Almont: Raymond Omer, born Oct. 17, 1914, at Almont, attended school through sixth grade. He moved away and later returned to Almont and lived with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Rickart Olson.

Rudolph N. "Red" Olson, a pioneer of Almont-Sims community, was born in Curlew Valley on Nov. 10, 1889, to Ben S. and Kirstine Olson.

Red homesteaded seven miles west of Almont in 1908. In 1911 he bought an additional 40 acres of land. He married Olena Oien from Red Wing, MN, in Mandan on Dec. 21, 1912. To this union five children were born: Judy (Mrs. Frederick J. Zempel), Almont; Omar (deceased) married Loretta Schreck; Lenora (Mrs. Francis Wagner), Ostian, WA; Bernie (deceased) married Noreen Olson; Marvin (deceased). Mrs. Olson died in 1927.


Red proved his homestead by farming small grains and feeds. Red's life was mainly raising horses and traveling the rodeo circuit. He was a wellknown figure, coming into town a week or two before rodeo time. People knew it was rodeo time when they saw Old Red pull in with his string of race horses.

Red, with his daughter Judy, son Omar, a wagon and team of horses with a string of horses tied behind would leave Almont in the spring and start on the rodeo circuit and probably wouldn't be seen in Almont again until winter.

Red was a rough, tough cowboy who rode the open range many years ago, but the open range is gone and so are the longhorns and wild horses he used to drive.

Red Olson took his last ride on Sunday, June 13, 1959. He was around the chutes and race track where he always was during rodeo season, when he died suddenly of a heart attack.

SEVERT OLSON

Severt Olson was born in Grimstad, Norway, in 1858 and came to the United States as a young man. He came directly to Fargo, ND, where he was employed for a short time. Hearing about homestead rights and other opportunities here, he came to Sims, ND, a thriving town then, and secured work at the coal mine. He left this work at one time and with a party of other young men, spent part of a year in the Black Hills prospecting for gold. With no success in that line, he came to Sims and filed on a homestead about a mile east of Sims. He became a member of the Sims Skandivanian Evangelical Lutheran Church in 1885. In 1889 he married Mina Jensen, born in Knitadaalen, Norway, Oct. 16, 1870. She immigrated to the United States at the age of 19 and came to Sims to visit her sister, Mrs. Issac C. Johnson.

Mr. and Mrs. Olson lived on their homestead a few vears and their two oldest children, Minda and Joseph, were born there. They moved to the lakebeds south of the Heart River, but in a short time came back to this community where he bought land 13 miles south of Sims. They built their home there and engaged in ranching. Their youngest son, Reuben, farms this land now.

There are 12 children in the family, two died in infancy. They also raised two of their grandchildren whose mothers passed away when they were infants. Minnie Fulton (now Mrs. Claude Ritz) and Everett Miller, both of Almont.

With this large family and the inconvenience of getting the children to school, he built a house in Mandan in 1906 where Mrs. Olson lived during the school years. Then in 1917, when the high school was established in Almont, he built a house there so the children could attend school.

Mrs. Olson passed away in 1927 and Mr. Olson in 1935.

Their family consisted of the following children: Joseph Olaus, born Aug. 22, 1893, died Aug 16, 1961; Olga (Mrs. Walter Timpe), Almont, ND, born May 17, 1894, has 7 children; Inga, born May 29, 1899, died Sept. 16, 1962; Helen (Mrs. Peterson), Corona, CA, has 4 children; Ragna (Mrs. William Knutson), Almont, ND, has 3 children; Ida (Mrs. Rudolph Feland), Almont, ND; Reuben, Almont, ND, 4 children; Viola (Mrs. Ted Moore), Seattle, WA; Minda (Mrs. Julius Fulton), passed away in 1914; Selma (Mrs. Miller) passed away in 1924.

SIGVAL OLSON 1897-1947

Sig Olson, a lifelong resident of Almont, never married and spent much of his young manhood running the family farm and caring for his mother.

He also provided a home for some of his nephews at various times. One nephew. Donald Olson. made his permanent home with Sig until World War II, when he was drafted in the army. Sig never liked to live alone and usually had a family living with him.



Sig was known around the community for his help with livestock and Andrew Kilen and Sigval Olson

served as shipping association manager most of his active life. This was the major marketing facility for livestock in our area. Cattle were shipped by rail and Sig would accompany the cattle to St. Paul, receiving a commission on the cattle for this service.

Sig raised Hereford cattle and Percheron horses, having some of the better ones of both at the time of his death. Sig considered himself a cowboy and was the horse wrangler for the family.

Sig's philosophy of this part of the country was, even in the 30's, that hard work and good management would bring success. He was always willing to lend a hand to his friends and neighbors.

Tobias Olson, son of Reinhardt and Tonetta Olson, was born Jan. 6, 1872, in Spangereid, Norway. He spent his early manhood as a sailor before coming to Sims, ND, in 1888 as a young man of 16. Here he worked in the coal mine and later the brickyard.

In 1898 Mr. Olson returned to Norway and on April 18, 1898, married Olevine Christianson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Christen Christianson. He and his new bride returned to Sims, ND, where they lived for two years before moving to the farm known as the Oscar Olin farm. A few years later they moved to the Andrew Kilen farm and then to the farm known as the Oscar Jacobson farm. In 1910 they sold their farm and with their daughters, Ragna, Goldie, Helga, Nettie, Gertie and Mallie, went back to Norway. After spending a year there they returned and re-purchased the Oscar Jacobson farm. Four years later they again went back to Norway, where their son, Arnold, was born. They returned to North Dakota later that year and settled in the Curlew vicinity on a farm about a mile from their former home and lived there until Mr. Olson's retirement in 1945, when they moved to Almont.
